


Older adults 65+ are growing as a proportion of the population.





Prostate Cancer incidence rates are significantly higher among Black/African American populations.
















Survey respondents' demographics









"Aging complications" and "Caregiver stress" are top 5 most important health problems.




Main reasons indicated for discrimination were age, gender, and race or ethnicity.




More than 1 in 3 older adults (55+) provide regular care or assistance for a friend or family member.









Almost 1 in 6 (15.9%) people 55 years and older who needed health care services did not get them.









More than 1 in 3 (37.8%) people 55 years and older who needed mental health care services did not get them.








Community Member Focus Groups

- **Key assets** included walkable spaces, local hospitals and community clinics, supportive services, support groups, and various programs for older adults.
- **Challenges** included struggles faced by caregivers, including overwhelming stress and burnout, difficulties navigating the health care system, lack of comprehensive caregiver training and support services.
- Caregivers expressed a desire for more visibility and awareness of the available resources and services in their communities to help them cope with the demands of caregiving.

Community Partner Listening Sessions

- Key topics: Mental health services, caregiver support, transportation, and the challenges faced by the "forgotten middle class."
- Key challenges: Shortage of mental health practitioners, need for more services for the older adults, caregiver affordability and stress, especially for those not qualifying for public assistance.
- **Barriers to Care:** Transportation, long wait times, limited-service areas.
- Overall improvements: Better information dissemination, improved coordination and collaboration among agencies and providers.



Transportation [to access healthcare] needs to be door to door...we [also] need people that would be willing to go into the home...it's so expensive to provide caregivers...[and] people want to age in place.
